Dear friends and colleagues,

The year gone by has been an eventful one with 'unexpected changes' – both at the global, and the domestic levels. Year 2016 witnessed a new era for the international development community - 17 Sustainable Goals came into force, which nations aspire to achieve by 2030. In accordance, the year saw us establishing a new Skill Development Centre at Bhagalpur in Partnership with Bihar Skill Development Mission (BSDM) to impart skill education to the youths and also strengthen our office at Patna in Bihar so as to streamline our service further. We focused on promoting evidence based decisions in the development sector and helped organizations to gather credible data, involve community voices to aid participatory program design and build monitoring, Evaluation and Learning (MLE) frameworks.



We established Rashmi Centre of Excellence and contextualized the Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs) indicators as per the context of Bihar to link evidenced based data with the current situation, developing technical advocacy notes to strengthen policies and programs through better provisioning. This year we will focus on operationalizing designed research. All our research and consulting projects now have a participatory action research component, with an aim to introduce innovative research tools other than surveys and interviews, and enable true stakeholder participation in designing, implementing and evaluation projects.

There are several positives we accomplished over the years, however, one of the main challenges we face today is the dearth of skilled and committed people to be part of our team. We invite organizations and professionals to collaborate with us and partake in our conversations on social impact.

One of the best things about working in the development sector are the perks of extensive travel to remote locations. Cumulatively, our team travelled to 06 Indian states over the last 12 months - visiting more than 50 villages. When we travel, we never know who we might meet, what we will learn or what skills we will acquire. As we regularly get exposed to and can validate our perceptions and knowledge by interacting with communities we work for, there is no routine burn out. We are able to get a better understanding of community beliefs, practices and realities, and build lifelong relationships with them through participatory research and interactions. This enables us to design programs which are impactful, comprehensive and culturally relevant. These experiences provide insight and solutions that have never been considered otherwise, and the opportunity to review, evaluate and modify our own understanding and practice. Finally, our travel helps to collect data on social impact. With the purpose of building evidence and highlighting promising and evidence based programs.

Emphasis is placed on ensuring people achieve the dignity, privacy, good health and wellbeing that comes with sustainable sanitation and hygiene behavior change, Gender Equity and Quality Education. To put up in a nutshell, We continue to place great emphasis on sustainable development - one that is inclusive, fair and equitable.

Last but not the least, the year has been a tough one for us, but it also taught us important lessons for future. An effective resource mobilization strategy is required to secure funds for The Janaki Foundation to enable it to reach the ambitious targets set out in the Strategic Plan. With your support we aspire to help tens of millions of people to achieve access to adequate and equitable sanitation and hygiene for all and end open defecation, paying special attention to the needs of women, girls and those in vulnerable situations.

I am excited about the future prospects and remain confident that we will seize these opportunities in the coming years by continuing to build a trusted, compliant and a strong social initiative. I thank all the stakeholders and supporters who have stood by the Janaki Foundation and continue to support us in times good and bad. I also reaffirm the commitment to sustainable development and focus on vulnerability as a central tenet of our proposition to create enduring value for all.

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Initiative to build capacity of stakeholders on Disaster Risk Reduction (DRR) & Climate Change Adaptation (CCA) in the State of Jharkhand

Purpose of the initiative was to build evidences, strengthen inclusive disaster mitigation planning at the state and district level in Jharkhand. It attempted to orient and involve the communities in Jharkhand on Disaster Risk Reduction (DRR) and Climate Change Adaptation focusing on building and strengthening a strong platform for respective departments (GoJH), Schools, PRI's, CBO's/NGO's at each administrative level for emergency preparedness, Planning and Response. In the process, The Janaki Foundation in partnership with IAG and UNICEF organized a **State Level Consultation on December 22, 2016 at Ranchi.**

in the State Level Jharkhand Conference on Disaster Risk Reduction - experts from Disaster Management Department, Health Dept., Govt of Jharkhand, UNICEF, UNDP, MECON, CCL, Plan India, Save the Children amongst others were part of the panel of four core sessions which addressed resilient villages, resilient livelihood, resilient basic services, Gender Vulnerability and resilient cities to strengthen Planning and the DRR/CCA Road Map of Jharkhand.

Hon'ble Minister – Welfare, Social Welfare Women and Child Development Department, Govt. of Jharkhand, Ms. Louis Marandi served as the chief Guest and inaugurated the consultation. Jharkhand to develop disaster risk reduction roadmap to reduce economic losses

In the light of the Sendai Framework for Action (SFA), Jharkhand state Disaster Management Department in partnership with UNICEF, Inter Agency Group and The Janaki Foundation is moving forward to develop a Disaster Risk Reduction (DRR) Roadmap to reduce economic losses caused by disasters by 50 percent, and the loss of lives by 75 percent. The effort is to work in synergy and convergence with other development partners and the stakeholder Departments of Government of Jharkhand to mainstream Child and Women Centric Disaster Risk Reduction (DRR) and Climate Change Adaptation (CCA) planning in the state of Jharkhand. The Janaki Foundation and Inter Agency Group has been an active partner in the planning process on DRR, draft the DRR Roadmap, conduct individual and multi-stakeholder consultations on the roadmap in Jharkhand. Experts from Disaster Management Department, Government of Jharkhand, UNICEF, Plan India, Save the Children amongst others were in the panel of four core sessions which addressed resilient villages,



resilient livelihood, resilient basic services, Gender Vulnerability and resilient cities in the State Level Jharkhand Conference on

Disaster Risk Reduction. Minister Welfare, Social Welfare Women and Child Development Department, Govt. of Jharkhand, Ms.

Louis Marandi served as the chief Guest and inaugurated the consultation. Minister Revenue and Land Reforms, Art Culture,

Sports and Youth Affairs, Govt. of Jharkhand, Amar Kumar Bauri was the Guest of Honour and chair to the session on Vulnerability and Gender in Disaster.

"The roadmap would ensure that all the safety norms stipulated therein are adhered to by people as well as the government machinery," Marandi said. She added that all buildings of public gather such as schools, hospitals, offices and government buildings should be built to be Disaster-resistant, and older buildings should be reinforced to be stable in the event of a disaster.

Col. S. Srivastava from

UNDP briefed the officials and the policy makers on the Sendai Framework of DRR. Mr. Subir Kumar, Convenor IAG informed that Disaster Risk Reduction (DRR) and Climate Change Adaptations (CCA) continues to be an evolving field.

As disaster risks evolve, and DRR practitioners undergo cycles of learning and reflection, different concepts take prominence to understand and act on disaster risk reduction. Ashish Kumar from The Janaki Foundation was of the view that Disaster Risk Reduction is an initiative with the policy objective of

anticipating future disaster risk, reducing existing exposure, vulnerability or hazard, and strengthening resilience. Dr. Experts from UNICEF highlighted the 04 Priority Areas that needs to be taken care off while working on Disaster Plans; and they include - Understanding Disaster Risks, Strengthening Disaster Risk Governance to Manage Disaster Risks, Investing in Disaster Risk Reduction for Resilience and Enhancing Disaster Preparedness for effective response, and to "Build Back Better" in recovery, rehabilitation and reconstruction.

To strengthen DRR/CCA planning across all 24 districts and 05 Divisions in Jharkhand, Divisional level Consultations were facilitated under the chairmanship of respective Divisional Commissioners to improve evidenced based planning. **Palamu Divisional Level Consultation # February 21-22, 2017.**

The consultation was held under the chairmanship of Dr. Rajiv Arun Ekka (IAS) Divisional Commissioner, Palamu and elaborated in Detail the need of strengthening the DRR/CCA Road Map. Officials from all the Districts in the Division were present in the consultation.

Literacy Program

JF believes education is a tool for empowerment, developing an identity, and enables girls to create spaces for themselves within their families and communities.

In an attempt to address the increasing drop outs of the adolescent girls as they grow up; The Janaki Foundation organized literacy campaign to sensitize the masses at Gamharia Block in Saraikela Kharsawan district of Jharkhand. The effort aimed at sensitizing the masses/communities to allow the adolescent girls to continue their education as this opens up wide opportunities for growth as they move ahead in their lives. The effort also focused on increasing enrollment in schools. The initiative listed those children who were out of school and advocated for their enrollment. Therefore, 20 children benefited from this activity. After counseling of parents, all the children admitted in the government schools and are currently getting all benefits of government schooling system.

Agriculture Horticulture Training Programme

The Janaki Foundation provided technical training orienting farmers on the scientific method to grow paddy that is called 'Srividhi'. This method is more productive in the dry land and the land of Saraikela Kharsawan in Jharkhand. From this method in low cost more productive, and in lowest rainfall it is productive. In this training, the farmers at Srirampur learnt that in small span of time the fruit trees grow and give fruits. As next steps, the farmers committed to plant trees and get benefitted more and more.

Child and women Welfare Programme

To mainstream the inclusion agenda of women and child empowerment, The Janaki Foundation organized sensitization awareness meetings at Begumpur Slum in Patna City Area (Ward No. 68) and at Chitkohra to orient the community on the entitlements available under various schemes pertaining to child and woman empowerment in the Health and family welfare department and the child and woman development department.

During the meeting, health screening was also done to the adolescent, pregnant and lactating women and Iron Folic acid tablet were distributed to 27 pregnant women post screening. The sessions witnessed detailed illustration and demonstration on exclusive breast feeding and its benefits. In addition the above, participants that included the adolescents, pregnant and lactating women of the community were also sensitized on the importance of vaccination to pregnant woman and children.

AIDS and Cancer Control Program

The organization organized AIDS awareness program at Aliganj in Bhagalpur to orient the adolescent and the young students on the issues of vulnerability and the causes of deadly disease of AIDS. Dr. N. Jha sensitized the youths of all the major preventive measures that should be adopted to stay healthy and fit and prevent oneself from AIDS. She informed that using contraceptive is one of the impactful remedy to prevent oneself from AIDS. Further, she illustrated on the need to empower oneself to get into the mainstream of development for a healthy and a sustainable life. Questions from the students were answered in the open house session at the end that was moderated by Mr. Vijay Kumar, Mr. Ravi Shankar, Mr. Subir Kumar and Dr. N. Jha.



The Integral part of the JF Mission Campaign on Cancer Awareness, initial screening and treatment is led by “बबली करे सवाल” **Ovarian Cancer Control Campaign**. As way forward, the organization sensitized the masses, students, women federations and the community on prevention, early diagnosis, screening, treatment and the isolation so often felt by women with cancer ... and that one must go to nearest government health institution for detection of cancer.

The Way Forward: Going ahead, The Janaki Foundation strategizes to scale up solutions, evidenced based knowledge and products in the form of e Repository # Center of Excellence and serve as a single source of contact pertaining to data on Urban Health / Health Systems Strengthening / Ovarian Cancer especially in the geography of Bihar and Jharkhand. The organization plans to strengthen capacity of Field Workers, improve institutional care, build capacity of Mahila Arogya Samiti and communities to demand for quality health services. We plan to use technological advancements to improve performance of health systems in providing quality services, generate evidence and increase management practices of service providers.

Community Empowerment Programme

As part of the Community Empowerment Initiative, the Janaki Foundation was successful in linking 17 old age women at Gamaharia Block, Saraikela with the Old Age Pension Scheme. It facilitated opening of the Jan Dhan Yojana Accounts of more than 25 women from poor women at Adityapur. This was in addition to regular one to one meetings with the women at Adityapur sensitizing them on the issues of Gender Empowerment, entitlements and inclusion.

Gender Empowerment Training

In an attempt towards Gender Mainstreaming and creating a gender just society, JF conducted Gender Sensitization Workshop for the adolescent and young students and the key officials on 10th September, 2016 at Patliputra, Patna. The workshop sensitized the participants on gender issues and encouraged them to address the issues and formulate plans with a gender sensitive perspective. The aim was to address the gender issue with the same zest as it is being spoken about in the media and society and to arrive at an ideological solution for gender based violence. Resource Person, Mr. Anand spoke in detail about the Sexual Harassment of Women at Workplace (Prevention, Prohibition and Redresser) Act, 2013 and the need for the formation of the Internal Complaints Committee at the Workplace.

Car Safety and Road Safety Initiative

“Indian Consumers Deserve Safer Cars”

When the World is gearing up for fully automated self drive cars, most of the cars sold in India lack basic safety features like air bags, antilock braking systems (ABS), electronic stability control (ESC) etc. Due to absence of strict safety regulations and testing procedures like Global New Car Assessment Program (NCAP), car manufactures design their cars in India without essential car safety features in name of cost cutting. Recently when some of popular cars in India were tested on NCAP standards and some of them failed badly.



India is World's sixth largest Car Market and 2.03 million passenger cars were sold in India as per last year data. India has been witnessing very high rate of road accidents resulting in the largest number of road deaths and injuries in the world. India accounts **1.50 lakh** fatalities and **400 deaths** take place **every day** on Indian roads. One of the major reasons behind high casualties in road accidents in the lack of safety features in Indian cars, specially the basic models which sell the most.

These are insufficient and ineffective compared to developed countries or the same cars being exported. Almost 30 % of these deaths can be ascribed to lack of proper car safety features in Indian cars.

Indian consumers are also not aware of these safety features as necessity to push the demand for basic safety features in the cars. While buying a car, consumers should give preference to safety features not, just its looks, price and other luxuries which is not there. Thus there is no real urgency shown by car manufacturers to incorporate safety features.

To spread awareness about the safety features in cars to prevent or survive accidents, the Janaki Foundation in collaboration with Consumer VOICE, New Delhi organized a consultation workshop at Jamshedpur, Jharkhand and Patna, Bihar on July 23 and 26, 2017 respectively. Dy. S.P Traffic, Mr. Vivekanand Thakur sensitized the participants in Jamshedpur and S.P Traffic, Patna – Mr. P. K. Das sensitized the participants on the car key safety components in Patna, Bihar spreading awareness and sensitizing them to prevent road accidents.

In Support of the Motor Vehicle Amendment Bill, 2016 and to mark Day of Remembrance for road accident victims and demand safe roads for all - The Janaki Foundation organized a WALKATHON from GOLGHAR to KARGIL CHOWK, GANDHI MAIDAN in Patna to sensitize the population on the importance of Road Safety # November 20, 2016.



Road accidents are an epidemic that the Government can no longer afford to ignore. And all avenues - be it Road design, driving skills, traffic management, vehicle design, policing, enforcement etc. need to be addressed through a strong and comprehensive Road Safety legislation immediately. This should be addressed in the Road Safety Bill 2015 which is under discussion in the Parliament. Hence, awareness on the Motor Vehicle Amendment Bill 2016 is an important step to curb vulnerability at streets and prevent many lives from accidents.



According to the National Crime Records Bureau (NCRB), in the last 10 years, over 12 lakh people have been killed on India's roads. In 2015 alone, 1.4 lakh people, including 17,000 children were killed in road accidents across India.

More than 100 people participated in the peace walk demanding safe roads for all.

Several organizations lent their support questioning the intent of government on bringing a strong road safety law. **The Janaki Foundation & Consumer VOICE** said *"The road safety bill promised by the Government is yet to see the light of day. All we have seen is severe dilution to the proposed drafts with many road safety statutes missing from the latest version"*

Skill Building Initiatives

Entrepreneurship is a vital tool towards achieving the larger goal of economic development and job creation, contributing to an overall development of the society. We are committed to supporting entrepreneurial skills development. During the year, we initiated the Rashmi - Skill Development Centre at Jagdishpur Block in Bhagalpur, Bihar to support the employable and entrepreneurial skills



development through skills mentorship especially in Computers, Soft Skills and Communication. This is in association with Bihar Skill Development Mission's - Kaushal Yuva Program - which provides the youths with a a platform to undergo a structured three-month mentorship program. This year under BSDM - KYP initiative, 225 Youths have been trained.



Science and Bio Technology Awareness Program

Due to climatic changes and low underground water level, farmers in the district are facing difficulties in irrigation of crops. To orient the farmers on climate resilient farming so as to cope up with the existing scenario, The Janaki Foundation facilitated a sensitization workshop and trained more than 50 villagers on jathropha plantation in district Saraikela Kharsawan, Jharkhand. In the meeting, Ms. Rashmi Jha – the Resource Person and the expert on the thematic also laid stress on the ergonomic agricultural tools so as to support women in agriculture and irrigation in a better manner for enhanced productivity.

Pulse Polio Awareness Campaign

The strong motive to eradicate polio from the nation leads JF to collaborate with the Rogi Kalyan Samiti, Gamharia and other Civil Society Organizations including Marwari Sabha, Adityapur Small Scale Industries Association (ASIA) among others to join the pulse polio campaign. In the process, more than 200 children of less than age five across the intervention geography were given polio drops for eradicating polio completely.

Drinking water and Sanitation Program

The Janaki Foundation (JF) Program on Safe Drinking Water and Clean Environment focuses on three core interventions:

- (i) Ensure Sustainable Sanitation through Community Led Total Sanitation.
- (ii) Community led total sanitation approach by facilitating creation of water and sanitation facilities by leveraging government resources along with behaviour change interventions to create open-defecation free communities that practice safe disposal of solid and liquid waste.
- (iii) Facilitating children and community to ensure safe drinking water, by promoting safe water handling practices (usage and purification) and protection of water sources from depletion and contamination.

Furthering the mission mandate - village level meeting was organized at the Sampatchak block in Gaurichak, Patna to sensitize the community on the depleting ground water level, Water contamination and the importance of health and hygiene for a healthy living. The effort entailed mapping of the toilets in the community and sensitizing the community on toilet construction, related entitlements and behavior change.

Participants were sensitized on “har Ghar, nal-jal yojana; as part of the seven commitments of the Chief Minister, Govt. of Bihar and action plan was drawn to avail the benefits.

Drug De-addiction Program

Government of Bihar launched the Liquor ban and the related Prohibition Policy in 2016 which impacted the lives of people in the community – who were used to drinking liquor on a daily basis. Due to strict implementation of laws, as they were not able to get liquor easily, their behavior towards their family members and the neighbor became violent and anti social. Realizing the pressing need, the organization facilitated counseling and guidance sessions in community at Patna and Bhagalpur. In all, more than 40 beneficiaries and their families were counseled for behavior change so as to mainstream them in the family and the neighborhoods.

Environmental Awareness Program

The organization organized awareness of environment among villagers in Gamaharia, Jharkhand and motivated them to plan at least 10 trees per person, in addition to initiating a ban on burning wastage of plants and crops. This is because it pollutes our environment and increase carbon- dioxide level. It was proposed to create manure pits for a sustained benefit.

Youth Affairs and Sports

The organization organized national integrity camp for youths and Elocution / Just a Minute speech competition to the issue of ‘national integrity of our country’. Selection of first three rankers and awarded them.

Ongoing program (for next year)

1. Skill Development Initiatives focusing at Bhagalpur.
2. Technical Assistance and Organization Development Support to Network Partners
3. Formation and Strengthening of the Rashmi Centre of Excellence with Chairs on Urban Health, DRR/CCA and Gender – to improve data analysis and Management facilitating evidence-based advocacy to inform positive changes in opinion, policy and decision-making processes.
4. Consumer Welfare and Protection Programs.

Proposed programs

The life cycle interventions / approach would be our core thematic focus in the next Financial Year. This is based on the evidence that children and women face multiple deprivations at different stages of their life including Disaster Situations and that multi-dimensional problems need multi-pronged, inter-sectoral solutions.

The Geographical Scope will focus on 38 districts in Bihar and 24 districts in Jharkhand. The interventions would be Technical as well as implementation mode - This is in recognition of the fact that to be relevant and effective - Our efforts are evidenced based, cost effective and impactful and takes into consideration the diversity of Districts context in terms of capacities and indicators. In regards, our programming content and strategies would be differentiating and adaptive to suit these diverse needs.
